REGULATION OF THE EUROPEAN PARLIAMENT AND OF THE COUNCIL

on the elimination of controls performed at the frontiers of Member States in the field of road and inland waterway transport

(codified version)

(presented by the Commission)

EXPLANATORY MEMORANDUM

1. In the context of a people's Europe, the Commission attaches great importance to simplifying and clarifying Community law so as to make it clearer and more accessible to the ordinary citizen, thus giving him new opportunities and the chance to make use of the specific rights it gives him.

This aim cannot be achieved so long as numerous provisions that have been amended several times, often quite substantially, remain scattered, so that they must be sought partly in the original instrument and partly in later amending ones. Considerable research work, comparing many different instruments, is thus needed to identify the current rules.

For this reason a codification of rules that have frequently been amended is also essential if Community law is to be clear and transparent.

- 2. On 1 April 1987 the Commission therefore decided¹ to instruct its staff that all legislative acts should be <u>codified</u> after <u>no more</u> than ten amendments, stressing that this is a minimum requirement and that departments should endeavour to codify at even shorter intervals the texts for which they are responsible, to ensure that the Community rules are clear and readily understandable.
- 3. The Conclusions of the Presidency of the Edinburgh European Council (December 1992) confirmed this² stressing the importance of <u>codification</u> as it offers certainty as to the law applicable to a given matter at a given time.

Codification must be undertaken in full compliance with the normal Community legislative procedure.

Given that no changes of substance may be made to the instruments affected by <u>codification</u>, the European Parliament, the Council and the Commission have agreed, by an interinstitutional agreement dated 20 December 1994, that an accelerated procedure may be used for the fast-track adoption of codification instruments.

- 4. The purpose of this proposal is to undertake a codification of Council Regulation (EEC) No 4060/89 of 21 December 1989 on the elimination of controls performed at the frontiers of Member States in the field of road and inland waterway transport³. The new Regulation will supersede the acts incorporated in it⁴; this proposal fully preserves the content of the acts being codified and hence does no more than bringing them together with <u>only such formal amendments</u> as are required by the codification exercise itself.
- 5. The <u>codification</u> proposal was drawn up on the basis of a <u>preliminary consolidation</u>, in all official languages, of Regulation (EEC) No 4060/89 and the instrument amending it, carried out by the Office for Official Publications of the European

Communities, by means of <u>a data-processing system</u>. Where the Articles have been given new numbers, the correlation between the old and the new numbers is shown in a table contained in Annex III to the codified Regulation.

THE EUROPEAN PARLIAMENT AND THE COUNCIL OF THE EUROPEAN UNION,

Having regard to the Treaty establishing the European Community, and in particular Article \boxtimes 71 \bigotimes thereof,

Having regard to the proposal from the Commission,

Having regard to the opinion of the European Economic and Social Committee⁵,

Having regard to the opinion of the Committee of the Regions⁶,

Acting in accordance with the procedure laid down in Article 251 of the Treaty⁷,

Whereas:

(1) Council Regulation (EEC) No 4060/89 of 21 December 1989 on the elimination of controls performed at the frontiers of Member States in the field of road and inland waterway transport⁸, has been substantially amended⁹. In the interests of clarity and rationality the said Regulation should be codified.

(2) Achieving freedom to provide services in the field of transport is an important element of the common transport policy under the Treaty. Consequently, it is the aim of that policy to increase the fluidity of movement of the different means of transport within the Community.

(3) Pursuant to existing Community and national legislation in the field of road and inland waterway transport, Member States perform checks, verifications and inspections relating to technical characteristics, authorisations and other documentation that vehicles and inland waterway vessels must comply with. These checks, verifications and inspections continue in general to be justified in order to avoid disturbances to the organisation of the transport market and to ensure road and inland waterway safety.

(4) Under existing Community legislation, Member States are free to organise and perform the aforementioned checks, verifications and inspections where they so wish.

(5) Such controls, verifications and inspections may be performed with equal efficacy throughout the territory of the Member States concerned and crossing the frontier should not therefore be a pretext for carrying out such operations,

HAVE ADOPTED THIS REGULATION:

Article 1

This Regulation applies to controls performed by Member States pursuant to Community or national law in the fields of road and inland waterway transport carried out using means of transport registered or put into circulation in a Member State.

Article 2

For the purpose of this Regulation:

- (a) "frontier" means either an internal frontier within the Community or an external frontier, where carriage between Member States involves crossing a third country;
- (b) "control" means any check, inspection, verification or formality performed by the national authorities \boxtimes of Member States \bigotimes , which signifies a stop or a restriction on the free movement of the vehicles or vessels concerned.

Article 3

The controls referred to in Annex \boxtimes I \bigotimes , and performed pursuant to Community or national law in the fields of road and inland waterway transport between Member States shall \boxtimes not \bigotimes be performed as frontier controls but solely as part of the normal control procedures applied in a non-discriminatory fashion throughout the territory of a Member State.

As and when necessary, the Commission shall propose amendments to Annex \boxtimes I \bigotimes to take account of technological developments in the field covered by this Regulation.

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Article 5

Regulation (EEC) No 4060/89 is repealed.

References to the repealed Regulation shall be construed as references to this Regulation and shall be read in accordance with the correlation table set out in Annex III.

Article 6

This Regulation shall enter into force on \boxtimes the twentieth day following that of its publication in the *Official Journal of the European Union* \bigotimes .

This Regulation shall be binding in its entirety and directly applicable in all Member States.

Directives

- (c) Article 2 ⊠(2) of Directive 2006/1/EC of the European Parliament and of the Council of 18 January 2006 on the use of vehicles hired without drivers for the carriage of goods by road¹² ⊲, which lays down that proof of compliance with the Directive is provided by a number of documents which must be on board the hired vehicle, viz., the contract of hire and the driver's employment contract;
- X (d) X Article 3(3), (4) and (5) of [Council Directive 76/135/EEC of 20 January 1976 on reciprocal recognition of navigability licences, for inland waterway vessels¹³], which provides that the navigability licence, certificates or authorisations must be produced on demand by national authorities;
- ★ (e) ★ Article 17(1) of [Council Directive 82/714/EEC of 4 October 1982 laying down technical requirements for inland waterway vessels¹⁴], which provides that Member States may at any time check that a vessel is carrying a certificate valid under the terms of the Directive.

Regulations

- (a) \boxtimes Articles 14 and 15 of [Council Regulation (EEC) No 684/92 of 16 March 1992 on common rules for the international carriage of passengers by coach and bus¹⁵], which entitle any authorised inspection officer to verify and control the transport ticket, authorisation or control document provided for in the Regulation; \bigotimes
- $(c) \otimes$ Article 19 of [Council Regulation (EEC) No 3821/85 of 20 December 1985 on recording equipment in road transport¹⁷] which entitles Member States to adopt measures which cover, *inter alia*, the organisation of procedure for, and means of carrying out, checks on whether the equipment complies with the provisions of the Regulation;
- Image: Article 5(4) of Council Regulation (EEC) No 881/92 of 26 March 1992 on access to the market in the carriage of goods by road within the Community to or from the territory of a Member State or passing across the territory of one or more Member States¹⁸, which provides that a certified true copy of the Community authorisation shall be kept in the vehicle and must be produced whenever required by an authorised inspecting officer.

 - Driver's training certificate
 - Safety instructions
 - Approval certificate (ADR or equivalent standards)
 - Copy of the derogation, if applicable (ADR or equivalent standards)
- (ii) Identification of the vehicle carrying the dangerous goods
 - Orange panel

 - placing on the vehicle
